ON OPEN ACCESS IN AFRICA

Perspectives on Open Access in Africa

This <u>PECE essay</u> by **Angela Okune** offers perspectives on the **politics of Open Access publishing**, paying particular attention to the potential effects a mandate like Plan S could have on the sociotechnical publishing systems on the African continent.

The essay includes a **recorded discussion** with scholars, activists and publishers from the continent thinking together about how such policies might impact them and their colleagues' everyday work. This data is a supplement to a forthcoming **thought piece** for a special issue of the journal "<u>Development and Change</u>."
